


Product All processed food

- The Codex Committee on Food Labelling has reviewed the allergen labelling in the general standard for the labelling of pre-packaged foods and is developing guidance on precautionary allergen labelling (PAL)
 - Includes definitions for food allergens
 - Exemptions in relation to the scientific advice and proposed alternate text
 - Sulphite and proposed revised text which includes the option of 'food as offered to the consumer' and 'food as consumed'
 - Format for the declaration of certain foods and ingredients
- The guidelines for PAL are submitted for adoption at Step 3
 - Determining if and how PAL thresholds can address cross contact from gluten containing cereals for consumers with coeliac disease

- The revised text for allergen labelling will be submitted for adoption at Step 6
- The guidelines for PAL are submitted for adoption at Step 3


Use of technology



- To provide guidance on food information accessed by consumers using technology via a reference on a prepackaged food's label or labelling, instead of providing this mandatory food labelling information on the physical label
- Sufficient technological infrastructure within the geographic area or country
- General population should have widespread and adequate access to the technology

For adoption at Step 8

Proposed draft guidelines on the provision of food information on pre-packaged foods offered via e-commerce



- To provide food information on the product information epage, similar to the physical food label, prior to the point of commercial sale
- To provide specific additional information for foods offered for sale via e-commerce

For adoption at Step 6

- There are a variety of changes in North America as both Canada and the US continues the modernisation of their regulations in relation to safety and composition
- The US is continuing with an emphasis on health and wellness as the Biden-Harris Administration comes to an end



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Regulatory modernisation of foods for special dietary use and infant foods







Product Specific food groups

Proposal to modernise the regulations for foods for special dietary use and infant foods. The key questions for discussion included:

- The proposed modernised framework
- The proposed requirements for infant formula, pre-packaged human milk, medical foods, conventional infant foods, gluten-free foods, formulated nutritional foods and foods for use in weight reduction diets
- The proposal for shortage provisions applicable to all foods for a special dietary purpose


Sodium reduction targets



- FDA draft guidance "<u>Voluntary Sodium Reduction Goals: Target Mean and Upper Bound Concentrations for Sodium in Commercially Processed, Packaged, and Prepared Foods (Edition 2)."</u>
- To describe FDA views on the next voluntary goals (Phase II (3-year))
 for sodium reduction
- In light of recommendations to limit sodium intake to 2300 mg/day, reduction to achieve an average intake of less than 2750 mg/day medium term



Genome editing



- The Guidance explains that the principles outlined in the NPV policy apply to foods from genome-edited plant varieties
- Details the two premarket processes that may be used:
 - voluntary premarket consultations
 - voluntary premarket meetings


New dietary ingredients





Latin America

- Various countries have proposed new regulations for gluten-free provisions, including clear labelling
- Additionally, there are new regulations on the use of sweeteners and sugar, as well as the consumption of energy drinks



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Public consultation on alcohol labelling







Product Alcoholic beverages

The following changes are being discussed:

- Replacement of current pregnancy logo with the below logo, to be accompanied with a warning statement:
 - Statement: No beba alcohol durante el embarazo ni en la lactancia ("Do not drink alcohol during pregnancy and breastfeeding")



 Additional new warning statement "SI VA A CONDUCIR, NO TOME ALCOHOL" ("if you are going to drive, do not drink alcohol") must be added

- Public Consultation <u>published</u> in September 2023
- Consultation deadline: 26 October 2023
- No updates have been published since

New provisions for gluten-free products







Product All foodstuffs category

- New definition: now includes ingredients that originally contained gluten but have had the gluten removed through suitable technological processes.
- New logo claims: Now 'Sin Gluten'; previous logo claimed 'Sin TACC",
 the Spanish acronym for "without wheat, oats, barley or rye"


Old

 New establishment guidelines: All establishment must offer at least one gluten-free option or a gluten-free menu from authorised manufacturers following specified guidelines

- Joint Resolution 32/2023
- Entry into force date: 30 November
 2023
- Transition period: 3 Years 30
 November 2026



Consultation on gluten free products




- Maximum content of gluten of 20 mg/kg
- Food products should use specified analysis to prove gluten free condition
- Specific wording established
- Use of gluten free logo



PERU

- Draft Decree
- Consultation deadline: 1 March 2024

Consultation on gluten free products



- Condition for the use of legend and symbol for gluten-free (20 mg/kg)
- In the case of imported products, all other similar forms, even in another language, are additionally valid, provided that they convey the same concept
- Draft Regulation of Law No. 31881
- Consultation deadline: 4 July 2024





New 'Sin Tax' for sugary drinks



- The Bill includes a Selective Tax (widely referred to as the sin tax) for goods and services considered harmful to health or the environment
- Sugary and alcoholic drinks are among the goods that would be subject to such taxes

- Supplementary Bill on Consumption Tax Reform, PLP 68/24
- Publication date: 25 April 2024

Non-

alcoholic beverages

Meat terms definition and restrict use of this designation for products of non-animal origin





Chile's Sanitary Code has been revised under Law No. 21644, which introduces:

Clear definitions for terms such as "meat" and "meat denomination"

This amendment also stipulates the conditions under which meat-related terms like "burger", "sausage", and others can be applied to plant-based products

- Law No. 21644
- Entry into force date: 16 November

New labelling requirements for products containing sweetener




 Proposal to update the Foodstuff Sanitary Regulation introducing a new article which requires a compulsory message on the label of products containing sweeteners, a legend along the lines of:

"CONTAINS SWEETENERS. AVOID CONSUMPTION BY CHILDREN"

CONTIENE EDULCORANTES EVITE CONSUMO EN NIÑOS


Law for the Control of Energy Drinks



Law for the Control and Regulation of Energy Drink has been approved which:

- Prohibits the sale of these products to minors
- Establishes regulations for the commercialisation of energy drinks
- Details the places where the sale of energy drinks is prohibited
- Law for the Control and Regulation of Energy Drink
- Publication date: 27 April 2024

Regulation of energy drinks



Draft Regulation of the Law

- Definition, compositional requirements
- Labelling requirements (including warning statements such as 'Sale and consumption to persons under eighteen (18) years of age prohibited'
- Maximum content of caffeine, inositol, taurine, among others, established
- Draft Regulation
- Consultation deadline: 12 November 2024

Africa

African countries continue to develop generally

- African countries continues to build up their food legislation to match developed markets
- Two pieces of legislation have been highlighted as points of interest



Marketing of food and non-alcoholic beverage to children







Product Various category products

- Draft regulations on marketing of food and non-alcoholic beverage to children
- No foods and beverages high in total fat, saturated fat, total sugars, added sugars, sodium and energy shall be marketed to children under 18 years of age
- Thresholds are provided according to food categories, per 100g
- An explanation of the nutrient threshold established per food category is supplied

- Publication date: April 2024
- No update since

African standard on insect and insect products







Product Various category products

Botswana has adopted / in the process of adopting 14 African Regional Standards for insects and insect value-added products. For example:

- DARS 1261-2024, Edible insects edible crickets specification
- DARS 1291-1-2024, Edible insects Part 1 edible insects' products
 specification
- DARS 1296-2024, Edible insects safety of foods based on edible insects

Middle East

Safety and quality is the main driver in the Middle East

 The main changes this year relates to improvement in standards, UAE developing its regulation and with Israel particularly active adopting a large swathe of EU regulations



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

Streamline food and water security & novel foods regulatory approval



- A framework to streamline approvals for businesses developing solutions to tackle global food and water security challenges
- Broader strategy to accelerate growth in the alternative proteins sector

- Announcement
- Publication date: 12 June 2024



44 EU regulations have been adopted







Product All foodstuffs category

44 EU pieces of legislation on various topics: labelling, contaminants, food contact materials, ionizing radiation, mineral water and certain claims have been adopted. Among others, the new reform establishes the following:

- Labelling will still have to be in Hebrew, and the red front of pack symbols remain. In the nutrition information table, sugar teaspoons still have to be declared, and sodium (rather than salt)
- There is still some national divergence (for example, there is still the requirement for an absolute absence of Listeria)
- The adoption of regulations on food contact materials applies only to Proper Importers using the EU pathway, and to Israeli manufacturers who choose voluntarily to adopt it

- Reform
- Different parts of the reform enter into force on different dates
- Publication date: 4 August 2024

Asia Pacific

Health & wellness is the main driver in Asia Pacific

There are a variety of changes including:

- to introduce and expand nutrition labelling (including front of pack) and claims
- encourage change through creating restrictions on advertising and use of a sugar tax
- China is particularly important as they have published draft legislation updating their labelling regulations which would include mandatory allergen labelling




Tackling advertising & promotion of unhealthy food to children (AUS only)



A public discussion on a research project aimed at exploring ways to curb the promotion of unhealthy food to children. The research is designed to shed light on the various strategies available to restrict such advertising.

- Public Consultation
- Consultation deadline: 15 March 2024

New 'genetically modified food' definition



- Specifies a new, single definition for 'genetically modified food', replacing the previous terms 'food produced using gene technology' and 'gene technology'
- Repeals existing definitions and introduces new ones for 'null segregant', 'novel DNA', and 'novel protein'
- Proposal P1055
- Consultation deadline: 10 September 2024

Consultation on new labelling requirements



The third draft national food safety standard GB 7718 General Standard for the Labelling of Prepackaged Foods was issued, with the following main revisions introduced (largely in line with the second draft):

- Revised manner of declarations for compound ingredients
- Additives and date marking
- · Mandating allergen labelling
- Additional rules for QUID
- New rules for the use of digital labelling

The detailed rules for certain marketing claims and the declarations of name and address and net content have been removed.

Voluntary front-of-pack nutrition labelling




Consumer Affairs Agency concluded on the use of FOPNL as a voluntary labelling system, which is separate to the mandatory nutrition labelling

- The proposed FOPNL will prominently display five key nutritional components: calories, protein, fat, carbohydrates, and salt equivalent, along with their respective proportions of the daily recommended intake
- Format is still to be determined




Insect regulatory framework



- Insect Regulatory Framework developed to govern insects for the use in food and feed in July 2024
- The Framework provides general principles on insects as food and feed and establishes a list of insects permitted for human consumption
- Any insects not included in the list are subject to pre-market authorisation
- Insect Regulatory Framework
- Publication date: 8 July 2024

Draft provisions on pre-market authorisation of alternative proteins




SFA will be introducing the Food Safety and Security Bill (FSSB), combining individual rules on different alternative proteins into one place by establishing:

- Definition of defined food (novel food, GM food, insect ingredients)
- Provisions on pre-market authorisation of defined foods
- <u>Defined Food Provisions</u> under Draft FSSB
- Consultation deadline: 14 May 2024




Mandatory nutrition labelling may be expanded from 2026



- Expansion of mandatory nutrition labelling (including FOPNL) to all processed food, excluding certain foods specified, e.g. those extremely low nutritional values such as chewing gums, alcoholic beverages
- Gradually implemented from 2026 by the size of FBOs, targeting to apply to all FBOs by 2028
 - Draft Amendment
 - Consultation deadline: 19 September 2024

Mandatory declaration for reduced net content of food products



- An Amendment to Food Labelling Standards to address shrinkflation
- A mandatory declaration of a change of net content for minimum 3 months where the net content of the finished product is reduced

- Amendment to Food Labelling Standard
- Published 27 Jul 2024 / entry into force 1 Jan 2025



TAIWAN

New conditions for nutrition claims







Product All foodstuffs category


The revised Regulation on Nutrition Claims for Prepackaged Foods has been published, laying down the following provisions

- Use of nutrition claims for prepackaged foodstuffs
- Extends the scope of the Regulation to include foods for special dietary uses, establishes rules for repeat nutrition information, revises conditions for making certain claims

The Regulation provides a transitional period until 1 January 2026 for certain revised clauses; other revisions apply from the day its publication.

- Publication date: 12 February 2024


Update labelling provisions



Labelling provisions introduced, include among others:

- Removal of mandatory requirements to specify whether natural or synthetic colour
- Addition of shellfish, squid and derived products to the mandatory allergens
- Removal of mandatory requirement to list ingredients in descending order
- Notification of the Ministry of Public Health No. 450 B.E. 2567 (2024)
 Re: Labelling of Prepackaged Foods
- 19 July 2024 2yr transition

Plant-based framework



Draft proposal for regulation on alternative proteins, with a focus on plant-based protein introduced, laying down the following provisions:

- Labelling requirements for products containing plant-based protein
- Standard for contaminants, microbial and residual limits
- A Draft Proposal for the Development of Regulations and Measures provisioning Alternative Protein, Plant-based protein
- Consultation deadline: 07 June 2024


New nutrition labelling



Ministry of Health Circular 29/2023/TT-BYT lays down the following, amongst others:

- · Scope of nutrition labelling provisions,
- · Definitions,
- · Mandatory declarations,
- Presentation of nutrition declaration
- Nutrient reference values
- Ministry of Health Circular 29/2023/TT-BYT
- Entry into force: 15 February 2024 / transition until 31 December 2025

Excise tax for sugary drinks



Draft Amendment to the Law on Excise Tax (Law No. 27/2008/QH12) proposes:

 A 10% excise tax (Special Consumption Tax) on certain sugary beverages specified in the National Standard TCVN 12828:2019, which contain more than 5 g/100 ml of sugar

- Draft Amendment to the Law on Excise Tax
- Consultation deadline: 9 July 2024
